


The University of Arkansas:

The American Institute of Architects awarded Jones prestigious Gold the Medal and ranked his Thorncrown Chapel in Eureka Springs as one of the five best buildings by an American architect in the 20th century.

They involve you in them.


They don't read from lecture notes.

They speak from experience. Dedicated, dynamic, and down-to-earth, our professors design courses and deliver information in ways that inspire you to think. Many of these teachers are shaping their fields through research that draws resources and recognition to the University and its classrooms. They include:

 Lori Turner - a professor of health sciences whose research into the causes and prevention of osteoporosis could help millions of women, young and old, maintain stronger bones and a better life.

· Ken Kvamme - an archeologist who uses ground-penetrating radar to discover and map ancient settlements without removing a single shovelful of soil.

 Derek Sears and Tim Kral - a professor of chemistry and a professor of biology whose research enables astrophysicists to investigate the likelihood and possible locations of life on Mars.





 Gisela Erf - a poultry science professor whose studies of albino chickens may one day help prevent autoimmune diseases and certain skin cancers in humans.

• Paneer Selvam - a civil engineering professor whose modeling experiments predict what will happen when a tornado slams into a building and whose work could help design affordable, tornado-safe structures.

• Kim Sexton - a professor of architectural history whose studies suggest the reemergence of the Loggia in Thirteenth-century Italy legitimized gambling and transformed the justice system from private interrogation into a public forum.

• Amy Farmer- a professor of economics whose work calculates the costs of domestic violence to businesses and suggests the damaging effects this crime has on social and economic conditions.

• Ellen Gilchrist - a professor of creative writing who has won the National Book Award, been nominated for the Pulitzer Prize, and written books that have inspired readers worldwide.

 LaVonne Kirkpatrick - award-winning professor of curriculum and instruction who is an admired mentor to students.



• Dale Carpenter - a four-time Emmy award-winning documentarian and professor of journalism at the University of Arkansas. His work includes "The Forgotten Expedition," the story of William Dunbar and George Hunter, who offered the first reports on Louisiana and Arkansas and discovered the natural hot springs that would become one of the country's first national parks.

• Yvette Murphy - has an extensive background in social work. As a professor in the social work department, she works with children who are raised by extended family members within the context of the child-welfare system.

 Raja Kali - professor of economics, recently received a grant from the National Science Institute to study and understand the evolution of industrial organization and institutional context using India's attempts to transition toward a market-oriented economy over the last decade.



 Charles Robinson
 is director of the African American Studies Program, but his colleagues and students know him as a professor who "engages students' minds and imaginations" a n d whose lectures are "passionate and intriguing." • Carol Reeves - professor in applied entrepreneurship, is on a team of researchers who are using a \$1.25 million grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to study the effects of domestic violence in the workplace

and is a mentor for students entering the Governor's Cup for Entrepreneurial Development.

• Gregory Salamo - serves as a physics professor of nanotechnology, and is responsible for advancing research in microelectronicsphotonics. Since 2000, Salamo has been awarded more than \$15 million in grants for both research and education from the National Science Foundation, the Department of Defense, the Department of Energy, and the Department of Education.



• Curt Rom - professor of horticulture, teaches courses in agriculture from the introductory undergraduate level through graduate and professional courses. His research programs enable undergraduate students to participate in laboratory, greenhouse, and field research experiences. He is recognized as an outstanding professor, receiving national awards for his teaching.





Fulbright Peace Fountain and the Fulbright Sculpture commemorate the legacy of the late U.S. Senator and former University of Arkansas student and president, J. William Fulbright. Fulbright believed that education, particularly study abroad, has the power to promote tolerance and understanding among nations.

Designed by noted architects E. Fay Jones, UA professor emeritus of architecture, and Maurice Jennings, the Fulbright Peace Fountain was constructed through private gifts from 115 individuals and 19 nations.

At the west entrance to Old Main, overlooking the Peace Fountain, is a seven foot bronze sculpture of Sen. Fulbright, created by artist Gretta Bader. The artwork was dedicated in October 2002, with former U.S. President William J. Clinton, himself a Fulbright protégé, giving the keynote address.

The Chi Omega Greek Theatre is located off Dickson Street. The theater is a replica of one built 2,400 years ago at the foot of the Acropolis in Athens to honor Dionysus. The Greek Theatre was a gift to the University in 1930 by Chi Omega, the largest women's sorority in the nation. Chi Omega was founded at the University of Arkansas in 1895. Over its seven decades, the Greek Theatre has been home to commencements, concerts, academic events, and pep rallies.

DIRECTIONS TO CAMPUS

FROM THE SOUTH: Take I-40 to I-540 North (exit 12). Travel from I-540 North to Razorback Rd. (exit 60). Turn right on Razorback Rd., heading north. The campus entrance is located at the intersection of Razorback Rd. and Sixth St. (also known as Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial Blvd.).

FROM THE NORTH: After Bella Vista, take I-540 South to Fayetteville. From I-540, exit at Hwy. 112 (exit 66). Turn right on Hwy. 112 and travel south for two miles until you reach the campus entrance at the corner of Garland Ave. and Cleveland St. (After crossing the North St./ Wedington intersection, Hwy. 112 becomes Garland Ave.)

FROM THE EAST: Take Hwy. 412 to I-540. See directions from the north.

FROM THE WEST: Take Hwy. 412 east via the Cherokee Turnpike from Tulsa, Oklahoma, to I-540 South. See directions from the north.
