#### From the Desk of... McGruff the Crime Dog

Hey folks! McGruff here, I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you for helping me Take A Bite Out Of Crime for the last 20 years. It's hard to believe I've been around that long. In my first print ad I said, "You don't know me ... Yet. But you will." Who would have thought that by 1987, just seven years after my introduction, so many people would come to know me? A study at that time found that nearly every child and 3/4 of adults in America could recognize my face and my Take A Bite Out Of Crime slogan and most of their parents had heard of me or my slogan as well.

But I didn't gain this fame on my own. I had a lot of help from people like you. Millions of people recognize my mug and follow my advice on personal safety, children's safety, senior safety, and getting involved in community crime prevention efforts because of your hard work in spreading my message.

In 1980, a group of concerned private citizens and public leaders launched the National Citizen's Crime Prevention Campaign, with me, McGruff, as their spokesdog. I started out telling people about common sense steps they could take to reduce crime - locking doors, leaving lights on , and letting neighbors know when they go on vacation. Later, my messages grew to include protecting youth, watching out for neighbors, and building a sense of neighborhood, creating communities that don't produce crime.

Then I developed special messages for children, my biggest fans. I want kids and teens to be safe. I taught them how to protect themselves against the dangers of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. Today you can see me in 3-D in new animated public service advertising spots and an accompanying comic activity book. I'm teaching kids how to handle bullies, what to do if they find a gun or other weapon, and how to protect themselves when using the Internet. And I must say, I do look pretty cool in the ads - just like I stepped out of the latest computer game. This helps me appeal to today's technology - savvy kids.

Now, I've built up quite a laundry list of accomplishments, but I haven't let success go to my head and I am not resting on my laurels. I'm still a dog in a trenchcoat with a job to do. My support group has grown into 400 plus member organizations which consists of federal agencies, national organizations, state and local crime prevention agencies, and groups, and community - based organizations. A hearty THANK YOU to all of you!

We have much to celebrate in 2000 - the new millennium, my 20th anniversary and crime's continuing decline!

Thanks again and keep up the good work in helping me TAKE A BITE OUT OF CRIME!


